Predicts Influx of Germans.

Prof. E. Jackson of the University of Toronto addressed the Hamilton Association on "Germany's Sea Power." He said Germany had no navy in 1870, but since then had built one that was second only to that of Great Britain. In the past thirty years Germany had acquired 1,500,000 square inless of territory, and during that period emigration had fallen off greatly. He predicted that after the war there would be a great influx of Germans to this continent. Laborites May Ask Scrutiny.
