Gave Name as "Anderson,"

but Is Thought to Be German

IS NOW UNDER ARREST

Claimed to Be United States

Citizen and Claimed Landlady
as Next of Kin—Investigation Ordered

Whether "Private Anderson," of the

23rd Battalion "Westmount Rifles," for

active service, is a German spy or not is a question that is interesting military authorities considerably just now. In any event, he was arrested yesterday morning as a precautionary measure, and turned over to the Provost Marshal, Major Date, who will hold the necessary inquiries.

It was stated at 23rd Battalian quaraters yesterday that so far they had little

direct information on the matter, although sufficient evidence had been gained to make it advisable to put I'te. Anderson under arrest, pending a full investigation.

So far as could be ascertained yesterday, Anderson claims to be an American citizen, but it was stated that he was plainly a German, his accent

and manners proclaiming his German

antecedents. This German appear-

ance started a close watch upon Anderson's connections. It was found that he had been boarding with a Mrs. Donnelly, whose son-in-law, when called, was surprised to see their exboarder, whom they took to be a German, and who had frequently expressed himself as a sympathizer with the German cause, serving in the ranks of a British regiment enrolled to fight the Germans.

Information was at once laid with Lt.-Col. Fisher. This brought out the fact that Anderson in enlisting had claimed to be an American

next of kin, claiming her as his aunt.
Investigation showed that she was no relation at all of Anderson's.

These facts, coupled with the German appearance of the man, were considered sufficient to warrant his arrest, and an investigation to show whether he was really a German spy.

It was stated yesterday by officers concerned that there was no direct evidence against Anderson, except the information laid by the son-in-law of his landlady, upon which the arrest was made, but that a thorough examination would be made by Major Date.

"All the evidence we have," said an

officer connected with the arrest, "is

that this man seemed to be a German, that he gave an English name, and alleged that he was an American citizen, while apparently he gave wrong information regarding his next of kin. The circumstances were sufficiently suspicious to warrant an investigation, and this will be held."
