

30-DAY TERMS GIVEN TO FOREIGNERS WITH CASH

One Bulgarian's Youth Won
Him Liberty—13 Were
Alien Enemies.

MAY BE INTERNED

More Canadian Bank Notes
Flashed Than Would Be
Seen at York Club.

"There were more Canadian bank-notes at the afternoon tea at the House of Industry yesterday afternoon than you would find at the York Club at any high tea any day in the year," said Crown Attorney Corley to-day, as the 73 foreigners arrested at the house filed like sheep through the Police Court dock.

Thirteen of the 73 were found to be alien enemies, Austrians and various sorts of Germans, who were sent over to Judge Coatsworth. They will likely be interned. One Bulgarian was let go because of his youth. The rest were every one sent down for 30 days in jail, with no option of a fine.

The sum of \$1,874.77 in cash was taken from these men by Plainclothesmen Ward and Anderson. They had all just had a square meal at the House of Industry when the police arrived and locked all doors. The money was found in boots, sewed in shirts, pants, and coats, and besides the cash there was about \$4,000 more in checks, money orders, and securities of all kinds.

Forty-four were Bulgarians, ten Austrians, twelve Russians, and the rest of mixed races. One, Peter Johns, had \$127; Tony Yonoff had \$124; Lastrano, \$101; Bucko, \$109; Pudn, \$85; Stessoff, \$66; Petroff, \$61; Popaff, \$56; EU, \$55; Deitch, \$49, and the rest from \$1 up to \$50.

These men have been lining up for meals for the last month or more, and entirely on their own initiative Plainclothesmen Ward and Anderson conducted the investigation. The police authorities are highly incensed at the nerve of the foreigners.

"These men, all with money, and fit to work, have been taking the food and shelter of the sick and destitute," said Col. Denison.

A much stricter watch will be kept on the charitable institutions of the city hereafter. It seems as if Toronto has the name of "Easy Mark" among certain classes who flock here for free board and lodging.
