Another important announcement was made by this sub-committee, it recommending the institution of a wood camp in township 11, on the line of the Greater Winnipeg Water district, about 47 miles east of Winnipeg. It was also ommended that \$50,000 of the Class B fund be applied to the operation of the wod camp, from time to time, as required. The entire report was fully discussed and it was then meved by Judge Myers, and seconded by Mayorelect Waugh, that "the report, as recommended, be approved and adopted, The motion was carried unanimously.
