## An Economic War to Follow.

Montreal Herald:--We may be quite sure that Germany is planning to wage flercer trade war than ever when the war is over, partly out of revenge, and partly to recoup her own staggering losses at the expense of the allies. There is no need to ask the spirit in which Canada will meet this competition. Both parties here are absolutely united in the desire to give Germany a far more severe lesson than was given her in her late trade war with Canada. But the mere desire to prevent Germany wreaking revenge in a trade war is not enough. We ought to be organizing to that end, and we ought to make it quite plain not only that Canada will co-operate in all the measures which Mr. Runciman broadly outlined yesterday, but that Canada expects Great Britain to take the strongest possible stand and lead in direction.
