

Eighty-nine Men Placed on Farms

Immigration Inspector Banford Dwells on Probable Short- age of Labor

Special Dominion Immigration Inspector Banford, at the Union Station office, stated to-day that last week's business was very similar to that of the week previous. Eighty-nine men had been sent to jobs on farms, and all the applications for help had not been satisfied at that. The material from which to choose in supplying this labor continues to be the same as in the weeks previous, and it is often difficult to select suitable men to fill positions, but so far the results obtained have been gratifying. Mr. Banford dwells on the desirability of the farmers getting their help, and as there is but a limited amount of labor on the market, and those who delay may be too late when they apply.
