Washington county. Bridge Not Badly Damaged. The bridge which Van Horn sought to destroy was not greatly damaged. Within a few hours cars were shunt-ed across one at a time, the pas-sengers walking over on the lee. By morning, railway officials said, the bridge would be strong enough for trains to use it without uncoupling. According to the police, Van Horn, a man of middle age, and of military bearing, told them that he left Ger-many five years ago, and for the past four years had been managing a coffee plantation in Mexico. Recent-ity he made unsuccessful attempts to return to his native land. Friday night he left New York city. arriving here Saturday night, and putting up at a hotel. That same night by appointment he met a man, unknown to him personally, at the east end of the bridge. The man five him a satchel containing dyna-mite.
