MAY BE BIG IMMIGRATION.

The high price of wheat and the low price of Canadian farm lands will prove the attraction for farmers in the United States during the present year, according to statements made by J. Bruce Walker, commissioner for immigration for Western Canada, in an interview at Regina. Mr. Walker was of the opinion that emigration from the United States would be considerable. His department was receiving a good many inquiries as to the conditions of settlers and the opportunities for farmers in all three prairie provinces. Mr. Walker, during his stay in Regina, conferred with the Honorable Geo. Bell, provincial treasurer, and Commissioner Perry of the Mounted Police when further arrangements were made for the distribution of seed grain throughout the west. Speaking of the increased area under cultivation to grain he gave it as his opinion that it was very likely that there would be a greatly increased demand for laborers when the spring work commenced.
