MANY GERMANS HAVE
FAILED TO REGISTER
The ignoring by Germans of the orders to register has resulted in the intelligence department turning their

eyes in the direction of those unnatur-

alized German residents of the city and

suburbs who have not so far come for-

ward, and efforts will shortly be made

by the military authorities to round

up every unnaturalized resident in the

city. A rough estimate of the number

of Germans who have not taken out

papers and who are not American

"paper" citizens, places them at one

thousand, and they are looked upon to a

certain extent as a menace to the dis-

trict. Already numerous cases of

breaking parole have resulted in men

falling to report being sent to Brandon to the detention camp. In most cases it has been Germans who have failed to report. V. Schoenfelt, a former employee of the Bank of Commerce in Winnipeg, is an example of the manner in which the authorities act. The young man broke his parole the month after he was registered and was at once rounded up and warned. The warning, however, dld not appear to have the desired effect, for he failed to report the following month, with the result that he is now a prisoner of war at Brandon, whereas by simply reporting he could still have held his position and kept his freedom.
