

RELEASED FROM INTERNMENT

After repeated applications to the registrar of alien enemies for his release from internment, Paul Jakob was successful. On March 25 permission was given for his release by Gen. Cottle on condition that he would report weekly. Jakob agreed to the conditions, and the registrar changed the order for the reporting to be done semi-weekly. Jakob was interned soon after war was declared, as it was believed he was a German reservist. When a detective was sent to obtain his signature to an undertaking Jakob failed to appear, and the next morning he left Toronto for the United States in an automobile with a woman who claimed to be his wife. Information led the police to believe that Jakob's wife was on a visit to Germany, and he was arrested in Niagara Falls and subsequently sent to Kingston. Later he was transferred to Stanley Barracks at Toronto. When issuing the release Jakob was warned that in the event of his failing to report he would immediately be arrested.
