WAR MAY GIVE NEW SENSE OF PROPORTION

Hon. Mr. Burrell's Address to Hamilton Canadian Club-Germania Club Closed

Hamilton, May 11.—Hon, Martin Burrell. addressing the Canadian Club this evening, said that if the sonaling of a Canadian army to a for-eign battlefield had proved čostiy, it had knit Canada closer to the mother country. We were now as stalivart as the best. The duity fell on those who remained at home to keep clean the body politic. He would not say whether there should be any election or not, but thought loyal and sympa-thetic support should be given to those who were bearing the heat and burden of the hour. The years of prosperity enjoyed by Canada were probably not an unmixed blessing, and the war would enable us to se-cure a new sense of proportions. Canada's great opportunity was at hand: she had the yast acreage cap-nble of feeding the greater part of the world.
