

BRITISH PUBLIC INSISTS ON INTERMENT OF ALIEN ENEMIES.

London, May 14.—The large American meat establishment at Smithfield today joined British confreres in displaying a notice to the effect that no business would be transacted with the Germans. The enthusiasm of the anti-Germanists was evidenced this afternoon at Tower Hill, a meeting place of London. One hundred black coated stockbrokers, merchants and city men, supported by thousands of the general public, stood in the drenching rain and wildly cheered speeches calling for the internment of Germans. The following resolution was then passed:

"Thousands of citizens of London, gathered together at a mass meeting, unanimously protest against any kith and kin of German mutilators, poisoners, and murderers of men, women and children, being any longer allowed to be at large in the British Islands, and fearing riots, fires, spread of disease and poisoned water, hereby unanimously demand that the Government take immediate steps to intern or deport all alien enemies, male or female, whatever their nationality, naturalized or otherwise."

This resolution was immediately telegraphed to Premier Asquith. Sinclair Smith, chairman of the committee of the gathering for the internment of alien enemies, delivered a speech in which he warned the Government that the temper of the people was such that unless the cabinet carried out the demands of the resolution the people would take the law into their own hands. "We are not out to advocate a revolution," said Mr. Smith, "but something must be done and done quickly to save the country."
