GUELPH ENEMY ALIENS BROUGHT TO TORONTO

WERE WORKLESS, PENNILESS AND HUNGRY—WILL BE TAKEN CARE OF.

Guelph, May 16.—All the Austrians,
Hungarians and Austrian Poles residing in the city were rounded up
yesterday, and about 50 of them sent
to Toronto to the detention camp,
where they will be interned.

Half a dozen of them called at the Police Court yesterday, and told Chief Randall that they were out of work, were penniles and hungry. The Chief wired Col. Sherwood, Dominion Police Commissioner, Otlawa, for instructions regarding their disposal.

He received word last night to round them all up and send them to Toronto, where they would be taken care of. The married men with families were allowed to remain. An escort from the 34th Battalion accom-

panied them to Toronto.
