Dominion's War Burden Great May Not Solve Unemployment,

BUT WILL CONSIDER **MAYORS' REQUESTS**

Convention Asks Grants of 40 Acre Farms and Loans to Stock the Land. Special to The Star.

Ottawa, May 26.—In reply to the deputation of Mayors from all over Canada, who asked the Government to do something on the unemployment problem, Sir Robert Borden said to-day that he would be pleased to hear the Provincial representatives the same hour to-morrow. He had had many representations from members of Parliament with regard to the prosecution of public works. "But," said he, "I hope you that conditions in the will realize that conditions in the Dominion and throughout the Empire are of such a character as have never been faced before. It has been estimated that Great Britain's part in the war costs at the rate of \$150 per second. During the time you gentlemen have been presenting your case we have incurred a liability of \$500,000. Under these conditions you will see how difficult it is for us to carry on public works, much as we may wish to do so. To carry on public works and the war at the same time is a heavy task.

More Money for War.

"The Minister of Finance has informed me that the commitments of the Government for the present fiscal year will total \$300,000,000 even if cal year will total \$300,000,000 even if we make no increase in the forces as contemplated last session. It may be necessary to increase these. You know we have to depend on the British money market for funds, and Great Britain has restricted loans. Foreign countries are excluded altogether, and to the Dominion money is lent only for the prosecution of the war. Even individual loans have been restricted. So under these circumstances you will see that the Government must pursue a policy whereby it can meet its obligations from time to time. It is impossible to spend money which we cannot lay our hands upon. Only where works are of a very important character can we continue to spend money."

The Prime Minister stated that it was the policy of the Government to assist the Provinces in the matter of highways, but that for reasons not necessary to mention this policy had been prevented from going into force. The question of the extension of Canadian industry had been engaging the attention of the Minister of Trade and Commerce for some time. Industrial exchanges had been under the consideration of the Minister of Labor.

It had been the policy of both Gov
nments to restrict immigration to enments to restrict immigration to the agricultural classes and to domestic servants. At present no laborers were coming to Canada. Regarding the question of assistance to settlers, the proposal might be useful in some parts of the country and not in others. This would be given the best consideration of the Government.


The whole question of unemployment, said the Prime Minister, had been engaging the attention of the Government for some time. He referred to the securing of war contracts for Canadian firms. The Shell Committee had placed contracts alone approximating \$200,000,000.
