The day was spent chiefly with ministerial work of a routine nature. The transfer Committee reported the transfer to London Conference of R. A. Brook, probationer, from Newfoundland; J. N. Gould, probationer, from Alberta; Rev. C. M. Marshall, from Toronto; Rev. N. D. Drew, from Hamilton, and Rev. J. W. Hedley, from British Columbia. The following were transferred from London Conference: Rev. F. E. Mallott to Toronto; Rev. II. D. Tyler to Hamilton. The Statistical Committee completed its compilations, reporting a total membership in the conference of 73,001, an increase of 1,026. Four new churches had been built during the year at a total cost of \$67,000—one each at Sarnia, London, Wheatley and Calragorm. Missionary receipts were \$90,981, an increase of \$7,817; and the total sum received for all purposes was \$663,353, an increase over the previous year of \$8,218.
