TORONTO HYDRO EMPLOYS NO <mark>ALIEN ENEMIES</mark>

GENERAL MANAGER COUZENS REPLAES TO CHARGE OF COUN-TY ORANGEMEN.

Prompted by a charge from County Orangemen that alion enemies were in the employ of the Toronto Hydroelectric System, and that British subjects were being discriminated against, General Manager Couzens yesterday presented a report to the Hydro Commission, showing that the birthplaces of his employees are as follows: Canada, 276; British Empiro, 269; United States, 16; Holland, 1.

Two men engaged by, Mr Couzens are the "unfortunate" possessors of German names, to wit: C. Schwenger and Joedick. It is proved that the former was born in Hamilton, and the latter in Toronto. Joedick was dismissed some time ago because his loyalty to the allies' cause was doubted.
