Toronto's Smoke Line May be Eliminated

Toronto's smoke line is to be eliminated if the city has its way, so far as the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific Railways are con. cerned. Property Commissioner Chisholm has been making investigations and finds that the railways and big manufacturing concerns can carry on their respective businesses without creating objectionable black smoke, and is therefore seeking a decision of Council to send the City Solicitor to Ottawa with an application to be placed before the Dominion Railway Board for an order that the big firms use a special kind of fuel.
