Internment of Fifty Hindered Malleable Iron Works.

Guelph, June 18.—On May 15 some fifty Austrians and Hungarians were rounded up by the police and sent under military escort to Toronto, where they were interned at the Provincial detention camp. Eighteen of the men were employed at the International Malleable Iron Works.
