Astonishing Revelation of Proposed Activity to Stop the Munitions Manufacture

۔ (Canadian Press Despatch.) London, July 19,-The Morning Post Budapest correspondent BAYS the Austro-Hungarian Government contemplates following up its note to the American Government with • scheme for the mobilization -10 American Austrians and Hungarians, of whom there are six millions in the United States, so as to interfere with the manufacture of war materials.

The despatch quotes a member of a club, of which Count Tisza, the Hungarian Premier, is a member, as saying:

"It is a great mistake on the part of America to bolleve that we are utterly powerless, for if worst comes to worst we have more than 15,000,-000 men, mosily in the castern States --Germans, Austrians and Hungarians—who are ready to menace the business of munition manufacturers." It is not quito clear what this means, the despatch continues, unless it refers to the bornbs and revolver of J. Plerpont Morgan's assailant, Muenter, who is feted in Vienna and Munich as a German martyr. There are 3,000 Hungarian socie-

ties in America which can Creato trouble and foment strikes, but for such an undertaking some central organizing body is necessary, and the American authorities may have something to say on that subject. Underground agitation, on the other hand. would he of very little use, though there are many thousands of Hunsarians employed in the factories of America that are turning out war materials for England and the allies.
