This book should be welcomed by all parties whom the present condition of war affects in a business way. To the solicitor it should be indispensable. It gives full reference to The Hague Convention on the legal rights of belligerents, contracts made with allen enemies during the existence of war, and contracts with allen enemies residing or trading in British, allied or neutral territory.

Famous Test Case.

There is a full citation of the famous case of the Continental Tire & Rubber Company. v. Daimier Company, recently reported in the English Court of Appeal, wherein it was held that the Continental Tire & Rubber Company, a British corporation, owned to the extent of 28.396 chares by a. German company, and the remaining shares, except one, held by subjects of the German Empire residing in Germany, that the plaintiff was entitled to recover for goods-supplied before the declaration of war.

Prof. Trotter's work will be found extremely interesting and informing by the general reader by reason of its illuminating chapters on international law.
