

SOME SETTLERS ARE GOING INTO CLAY BELT THIS SUMMER

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In Spite of depression Caused
by War Con-
ditions

Interment Camp at Kapuskas-
ing is an Interesting
Settlement

Although things are comparatively quiet in the Clay Belt at the present time, quite a number of settlers are coming into the country in spite of the unfavorable conditions caused by the war.

The establishment of a regular schedule along the National Transcontinental has greatly improved the train service, and when taken in conjunction with the service on the Algoma Central makes the district fairly easy to access.

There is quite a settlement around Hearst as well as at various points further south on the Algoma Central, but the most interesting settlement at the present time is that at the interment camp at Kapuskasing on the Transcontinental some distance east of Hearst. There are now over 1,200 aliens interned there, and these with the soldiers of the guard makes quite a town, one which provides good business for those that are supplying it.

The Ontario Government is building several roads in different sections of the Clay Belt and generally improving interior communications, making it more attractive for settlers.
