

# RENEWED PRECAUTIONS ON NIAGARA BORDER

Ferry Boat Hours Reduced—  
Quiet Day in Camp, With  
Officers Here.

Niagara-on-the-Lake, Ont., Sept. 2.—With the officers of the headquarters staff visiting Toronto for Military Day at the Fair, and the departure of the 35th and 37th for review by the Duke of Connaught, the camp was quiet to-day. The staff and the second battalion went over on Chippewa at 8.30. The staff included: Col. W. A. Logie, G.O.C.; Lieut.Col. S. C. Uewburn, A.A.G.; Litut.-Col. F. W. Marlow, AD.M.S.; Capt. Morris, A.D. C.; Major Henry C. Osborne, D.A.A. G.; Major Clyde Caldwell, C.E.; Major H. C. Milsom, A.D.S., and T., and other staff officers.

Rumors flew about and women folk sat up all night thinking of and waiting for the German border raiders, the phantoms of the camp.

Records show that 800 hostile aliens have been interned to date by the authorities of this division. Guards totaling 50 men are kept constantly at Niagara Falls and the Soo.

Ferryman crossing Niagara River near camp have been ordered to reduce the hours for plying, and all persons crossing after 9 p.m. will be liable to arrest and boats seized.
