COMPENSATION WANTED FOR RAILWAY EMPLOYEES

TRADES CONGRESS WILL SEEK MORATORIUM OF PRINCIPAL ON WORKMEN'S HOMES,

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Vancouver, Sept. 21.—The Trades and Labor Congress this morning debated the suggestion of the Moneton Trades and Labor Council that the Dominion Government be asked to pass a compensation act to protect Government railway employees. It was stated that these workers were not included in the provisions of the compensation acts of the various Provnices. The Executive Committee favored action through the Provincial Legislatures. James Simpson, Toronto, criticized the proposed moratorium covering the payment of the principal in real estate purchases, sought by the Montreal Trades and Labor Council. Finally it was decided to seek a moratorlum covering the principal on worklingmen's homes.

The committee yesterday did not concur in the suggestion from Guelph, advocating that the Government make it imperative that all unnaturalized men of cnemy birth be at once removed from civil life and placed in detention. In connection with this, a letter was received from Hon. T. W. Crothers, in which it was said that patriotism and fair play should prevent any objection to these men working, Another resolution was that all allen enemies should be returned to their native innds. This, however, did not meet with approval.

AUSTRIA'S NEW ENVOY TO U.S. SELECTED

KAJETAN MEREY VON KAPOS-MERE NAMED TO SUCCEED DR, DUMBA,

Budapest, Hungary, Sept. 21,—A Vienna despatch is published here today saying it has been learned in diplomatic circles at the Austrian capital that the Government will not await the arrival of Dr. Constantin Dumba from the United States before appointing his successor. The new Ambassador, it is stated, will be named at once.

The despatch says that Kajetan Mercy von Kapos-Merc, former Austro-Hungarian Ambassador at Rome, has been selected for this place.

tro-Hungarian Ambassador at Rome, has been selected for this place. Kajetan Merey von Kapos-Mere served as Austro-Hungarian Ambaskador at Rome from Jine of 1910 to August of last year. In March of this year he returned to Rome as representative of his Government in the unsuccessful negotiations with Italy in regard to territorial concessions by Austria, which preceded Italy's entrance into the war.
