GERMANY'8 -WAR REPLENISHING CHEST.

To the Editor of The Globe: Canada wants money, and wants it very badly, for our wounded soldlers and their wives and dependents, and there is no reason why the Germans and Austrians earning their living in this country should not be made to supply the amount required for this purpose. Everything in the way of money and goods that can be kept from Germany will bring the war nearer to a close. Canada can exercise great influence to bring about this result. Every week Germans and Austrians are sending money home via the States and Switzerland, which money goes to enrich the war chest of Germany.

One-sixteenth of the population of Canada is of German and Austrian birth, yet. with the exception of a few who have misbehaved themselves and have been interned, all these allen enemies have been allowed to work and earn money, to the detriment of Britishers. According to the last census, made in 1911, there are in the Dominion 129,103 Austrians and 393,000 Germans. If one-half of these alien enemies were to send home every week to their native country \$5, they would be sending about \$1,305,270 out of Canada. This is so much given to the German war chest, and helps to buy shrapnel to kill our boys at the front.
