## BULGARIANS TREATED AS ALIEN ENEMIES NOW

The necessary orders in Council de-claring war with Bulgarlan und ploe-ing the Bulgarlans under the various orders in Council which apply to other allens will be passed at once. In the meantum also orders are be-ing yen to stop any Bulgarlans from leaving the country. It is not anticipated there will be any trouble with the Bulgarlana, as it is believ-ed most of them in Canada are in sympathy with the allies. The ex-perience of the officials after a year's dealing with the Austrians is that they have little sympathy with their homeland, and are anxious to obey Canadian laws and behave like Can-adian clitizens. The only allen ene-mies who have caused trouble are the Germans.
