AIRMEN DISPLACE SUBS. IN WAR ON BRITAIN

THREE AEROPLANES ATTACK A BRITISH STEAMER—ALL THE BOMBS MISS.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Nov. London, 5.—Germany pears to be trying a new method of attack on British merchantmenwith aeronlanes. The Cork steamer Acova, which has arrived at Man-chaster, tells a story, according to The Liverpool Journal of Commerce, of a thirty-five minutes' engagement with three hostile aeroplanes at 11 o'clock on the morning of October 30. One of the aeroplanes was a large battle plane, which dropped six bombs, some of which missed the steamer by not more than

When the bombs were exhausted the battle plane fired on the Acova with a machine gun. The ship's sides and deck were struck by bullets, but

all the crew escaped injury.
At a height of from 800 to 1,000 feet all the aeroplanes dropped hombs and attacked the steamer with rifles. The Acova's escape was due to zigzag manoeuvring and the fact that the aeroplanes dured not fly lower.

CENSUS OF ALIENS.

It is Urged on the Government by Kingston Labor Council.
