JASPER PARK TO BE NEW INTERNMENT CAMP

Ottawa, Dec. 15 .-- One of the biggest difficulties that General Sir William Otter has had to deal with in looking after his 7,200 interned aliens has been that of securing sufficient winter clothing. The Canadian and British Govern-

ments and the governments of the Allies have been so busy purchasing clothing for their troops that the Caciothing for their troops that the Ca-madian manufacturers have been scarcely able to meet the demand. General Otter has had a good deal of trouble, therefore, in secur-ing boots, socks, and underwear for his prisoners of war. There was

no difficulty in obtaining the other clothing. In one western camp the work had

to be suspended when winter came on because the men were literally "on their uppers." A new camp is being established in Jasper Park, near the Yellow-head Pass. This makes eight work-
