

# LIEUT.-COL. F. F. CLARKE, OF KAPUSKASING, BANQUETED

**NON-COMMISSIONED OFFICERS PRESENTED HIM WITH  
DRESS SWORD AND MRS. CLARKE WITH A HAND  
SOME TRAVELLING BAG.**

On Sunday evening last Lieut. Col. F. F. Clark, on the eve of his departure from Kapuskasing to take command of the new regiment No. 127 which is to be recruited entirely in the County of York, was banqueted by the officers of the Internment Camp. The dinner was to have started at seven o'clock but was held for the arrival of the "National" until ten o'clock. When the Cochrane visitors, who had received a special invitation: Messrs. W. B. Way; H. A. Laird; G. H. Chisholm and G. H. Clemes arrived.

Lieut. Col. Clark, who has been at the camp since its commencement gave an interesting address on the work that had been accomplished there since December 15th, 1914. There is now at MacPherson a population of some 2,000, have cleared about 700 acres of land and built 33 miles of roads and bridges. A large portion of the cleared land was under cultivation during the season of 1915 and produced excellent crops.

Two immense barns are about completed for use of the Dominion Government for experimental farm purposes.

In all 120 buildings have been erected.

The non-Commissioned officers presented Lieut. Col. Clark with a dress sword and a handsome travelling bag for Mrs. Clark.

Lieut. Col. Clark was very much affected at this token of their esteem and will be greatly missed by officers, men and prisoners as he has always been capable and courteous, treating one and all with true British justice. The dinner was held in the mess hall, the table was prettily decorated and the menu was most excellent and well served. The several toasts were drunk with enthusiasm.
