

114 RECRUITS SIGNED

Rallies in Theatres Indicate That Recruiting Will Keep Up.

At five different Sunday recruiting meetings at Toronto theatres yesterday 114 recruits were signed on by the sergeants of the Recruiting Depot.

The biggest results were won at the Park Theatre, on Lansdowne avenue, north of Bloor street, where after speeches by A. E. Donovan, M.L.A., Lieut.-Col. Vaux Chadwick, Major M. S. Boehm, and Sergt.-Maj. Donovan of the Dragoons, at least 60 signatures and 40 more promises to call were secured.

Two immense crowds attended the afternoon and evening meetings in Loew's Theatre, where six regimental bands and a dozen soloists crowded six hours full of music. Among the speakers were: Miss Helen Losanvitch, the Serbian woman, who witnessed the Austrian pillage of Serbia; Lieut. J. B. Price, of the Americans; R. R. Gamey, M.L.A.; Captain Mavor of the 15th.; and J. B. Gould of Boston, who was joyously un-neutral. Ten recruits were secured in the afternoon and twelve at night.

At the Star Theatre, Mr. D'Arcy Hinds was in the chair. Pte. Andrews of the Queen's Own, a young returned soldier, who has made some of the most thrilling recruiting speeches Toronto has heard, made his last appearance at this meeting, as he is going with the guard to ~~Kapusking~~ to-morrow. He had the satisfaction of being instrumental in getting twenty-one recruits last night.

At the Templars' Hall, Queen street and Dovercourt road, the first recruiting meeting of the new Khaki Club was held. Thomas Hook, M.L.A., acting as chairman. Hon. Thomas Crawford, Lieut.-Col. Chadwick, Maj. Boehm, and Oliver Hezzlewood were the speakers.
