.WRECKED BY SOLDIERS Bust of Kaiser Dragged in Street to Barracks After Raid

HALL IN BERLIN, ONT.,

Berlin, Ont., Feb. 16.-Some sol-diers of the 118th Battalion, who were on night leave, raided Concord-

ia Hall in the new Jansen Block here last evening, and demolished the furniture, including plane, pic-tures, etc. About fifty men took possession of the hall, threw chairs

cut of windows, jumped on tables, and pounded the piano beyond repair. The goldiers opened a small store room where flags and pictures of German heroes had been stored, and carried these down King street to the

front of the recruiting rooms, where they were trampled upon and form to shreds. They also found a bust of Kaise Wilhelm I., which had been kept in Cencordia Hall rince it was taken

from the lage in Victoria Park, into which it was thrown by practical jokers soon after the war started. They dragged the bust, up the street amid cheers and singing, and it is now stored in the barracks in Queen street. Concordia Hall has been

closed for the remainder of the war, but when the soldiers reached the hall they were met at the door by President L. Bardon.
Soon after the raid was started
Col. Lochead, Col. Martin, Capt. Fraser and other officers of the battallon were notified, but by the time

of their arrival all the damage had been done. They marched to the barracks singing "We'll Never Let the Old Flag Fall."

The raid follows close on the de-struction of the granite base of the Kaiser Wilhelm monument in Vic-toria Park, which resulted in the Park Board ordering the removal of the remainder of the monument. Mayor Hett said he would ask that military police be provided.
