Protestants were lacking sadi radly availing themselves of their oppor-tunities. Galicians, Finns, and Poles were determined to keep their language, and it was a grave problem to be faced by all who love their Church. The brotherhood of man had been advanced by life and association in the trenches, where British, French, Italian and Russian fight for the allies, but much is needed at eur own door in Canada.
