"Newspapers were informed that the resolution could not get a seconder. This also is not so. Every member of the committee present was emphatic that no dangerous man should be employed, but it was thought better that the engineer should be requested to provide the committee at its next meeting with a list of the employees of the waterworks, including place of birth, extraction, age, length of service with the city and if of alien birth, when naturalized.
