CHINAMAN IS FINED FOR VIOLATING LAW

Convicted in Burnaby Court on Four Charges of Infractions of Sanitary Regulations.

EDMONDS, March 13.—A Burnaby

Chinaman named Ah Sam paid \$100 and costs in Edmonds police court on Saturday when he was convicted on no less than four separate charges of infractions of the sanitary regulations in regard to keeping and slaughering hogs in the municipality. He was fined \$25 and costs in each case. The accused had a number of convictions of a similiar nature against him.
