

GERMAN LIEUTENANT SENT TO FORT HENRY

He Had Been Seeking to Dis-
suade Young Men in
Waterloo

Berlin, Ont., March 17.—Heinrich Hansing, aged twenty-seven years, will leave for Fort Henry in-
terment camp under military escort to-morrow morning. Hansing is a typical German, and since he was unable to answer the call of his fatherland at the commencement of the war owing to the refusal of the authorities to let him cross the line at Niagara Falls, he has been devoting his attention to discouraging young farmers from enlisting by assuring them that the Kaiser was bound to win. This resulted in his arrest by Chief of Police O'Neill and a Dominion Police Officer near Floradale yesterday.

Hansing's trunk was examined by the officials and they discovered that he was formerly a Lieutenant of the German Imperial army up to 1913, and in 1911 he was a mariner on the famous war vessel *Karlschue*. He had in his possession a large mass of German newspaper clippings and letters addressed to pro-German papers in the United States. Postcards showed that he was an officer in the 2nd Baden Field Artillery, Regiment No. 50. He has been in Canada about two years, and has been engaged as a farm laborer in the northern portion of the county. He worked in Berlin about eight days.
