GAVE WAY TO FEAR OF BEING KILLED BY MOB

Policeman Smith (521) is Dismissed From Police Force for Cowardice

Policeman Smith (521) was yesterday afternoon dismissed from the police force by the Board of Police Commissioners on a charge of cowardice in describing a commade.

A fight occurred at Broadview avenue and Queen street on March 28th, when a crowd of fifteen hundred persons, composed of soldiers and civillans, attacked a Pape avenue station policeman. Smith, according to the Chief Constable, fied to the station and did not return until reserves were summoned from other divisions and the military picket brought from the centre of the city. In answer to the charge made by Inspector Pogue, Smith stated that he did not want to be killed.

Veteran Officer Retires.

The personnel of the force was further affected by the resignation of mounted Police Inspector Gilks, who is granted the customary leave of absence that he may obtain his pension on May 1st and leave at once. Detective Murray, who has had much cavalry experience here and in the old country, may succeed him. He is now Acting Registrar of Allen Enemies. Chief Constable Grasett, after the meeting of the Board of Police Commissioners, said he was sorry to lose Inspector Gilks. Inspector Gilks came to the police force with Lieut.-Col. Grasett from the Life Guards.

Given a Merit Mark.

Policeman Shearer (271) was given a merit mark for his efforts to resuscitate Mr. Jacob McDermott of Brock avenue, who died from illuminating gas poisoning.
