Washington Recognizes Canadian Censorship

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Washington, April 11.—Several protests have been made to the Postoffice Department recently by postal

authorities of offices along the Canadian border that American letters have been opened in the Dominion and passed upon by a censor. No action has been taken, and it was understood today to be the feeling of authorities here that mail in Canada is subject to such regulations as the Canadian Government may make.
