AUSTRIANS TAKE PLACES OF STRIKING RUSSIANS

A labor situation like that which developed at Bracebridge and Acton last week is now or in Toronto, according to striking Russian employees of Mr. M. Granatstein, 486 Wellington street west, who say Austrians from the detention camp are taking their places. Granatstein, according to his men, has 53 allen enemies in his employ. Some 120 Russians are on having asked for 50 cents a strike, week increase. When the Austrians were brought in there were daily quarrels, until an open break occurred. Mr. Granatstein says his men are not worth any more than has been pald them.

The factory was pickeled recentlyby the strikers, who were attacked, it is said, by the Austrians, armed with iron brought from the junk shop. Granatstein brought an officer from Claremont Street Station to arrest the strikers. Nothing was done however.
