crime. Von Igel is at liberty under \$20,000 bail. A hearing in his case is set for next Tuesday. Federal prosecutors lasserted that he would be released only upon instructions from the Attorney-General in Washing. Counsel has been engaged for the accused man, and a diplomatic and legal battle to obtain his release is
