

# BILINGUALISM APPEAL ARGUED BY SIMON

## REGULATION BEYOND THE POW- ER OF EDUCATION MINISTER TO ISSUE IT.

(Canadian Associated Cable.)

London, July 10.—The Privy Council to-day continued hearing the Roman Catholic schools appeal from the Ontario Supreme Court, raising the question whether Ottawa Catholic schools shall be conducted according to the views of the French-Canadian ratepayers or according to the curriculum formulated in the circular issued by the Catholic school trustees. Sir John Simon, continuing his argument for appellants, asserted that he had already given cogent reason why the mandatory injunction ought to be discharged. Under the power of appointing, the trustees levied and administered their own school rates, and determined the number, kind and description of the school, appointed local teachers and superintendents, and defined the duties of both. Therefore the regulation "cut into their statutory authority in many ways, and was ultra vires the Minister of Education to issue to them. He had also given cogent reason why the regulation was also ultra vires of the Legislature of the Province, as not conforming to section 93, British North America Act. The hearing adjourned.

## HUNGARIAN INTERNED.

### He Wrote Asking Friend About Getting Smuggled Over Border.

Owen Sound July 10.—Acting under instructions from the Dominion Police at Ottawa, John Kuhar, a Hungarian, was placed under arrest on Wednesday and taken Friday afternoon to Stanley Barracks, Toronto, by P.C. Bone. Kuhar came to Owen Sound from Brampton three weeks ago to work in the Malleable Iron plant. He evidently had not been complying with the regulation which necessitates enemy aliens to register, and he was discovered by the censoring of a letter which he sent to a friend in the United States, in which he asked if anything could be done to smuggle him across the border.

## DEATH CALLS JOHN McCOSH.

### Local Registrar of High Court at Barrie.

Barrie, July 10.—John McCosh, local Registrar of the High Court, died here yesterday. He was seventy-two years of age, and had been in poor health since the death of his wife six months ago. Mr. McCosh was born in Paris, Ont.; studied law under M. C. Cameron of Toronto, and was graduated from Osgoode Hall. He practised his profession in Orillia for thirty-five years. For a time Judge Gunn was a partner. He was Mayor of Orillia for four terms and a candidate for the Legislature in 1896, opposing Mr. J. B. Tudhope. He is survived by his son Percy and the following daughters: Mrs. D. Harwood, Fernie, B.C.; Mrs. (Dr.) Anderson, Victoria, B.C., and Mrs. Finlayson of Toronto.

## CAPT. GORDON PROMOTED.

London, July 10.—Capt. A. M. Gordon of Ottawa has returned from France to become Senior Chaplain of the Canadian division. Chaplain Father O'Leary of Quebec city is promoted to Lieutenant-Colonel.
