Proclamation Addressed to Austrians. Hungarians, and Croatians Published. Canadian Press Despatch.

CALLED TO ARMS IN U.S.

New York, July 30 .- A proclamation, calling upon all patriotic Austrians, Hungarians, and Croatians to forward their addresses at once to their nearest consulate, has been for-

warded for publication to all pro-Austro - Hungarian newspapers throughout America by Charles Winter, who is in charge of the Austro-Hungarian Consulate in this city. This is taken as an indication that a

partial mobilization of Austrian forces has been ordered. The proclamation contains the amnesty proposal announced on Tuesday. At the consulate to-day it was said that returns were expected to be re-

ceived this week from all Austrian subjects who have received special or individual calls to arms. These reservists, it was said, would be the first to be sent over, then will come the others who have answered the general mobilization call.

Thus far the war clouds overhanging all Europe have not affected the bookings for European ports, nor is

it believed that many bookings have been cancelled on account of it. About 400 Austrians and Servians sailed vesterday on the La Savole, among them the Count Karolyi, lender of the Hungarian Independent party.
