GERMAN PRISONERS ESCAPE.

Iwo From Kingston Get Into New York State.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

New York, Aug. 27.—An Associated Press despatch from Watertown, New York, yesterday says:

Two German prisoners who escaped from the Canadian Internment prison, Fort Henry, Kingston, Ont., have reached Claytown, N. Y. The men are Wiley Prubacher, formerly a paper mill engineer at Rimouski, Que., and Erwin John, a merchant from Brazil.

The men made their escape last Wednesday. They were allowed to work in a garden at Fort Henry, and for months had dug a hole under a flower hed in the garden. They secreted themselves in this hole Wednesday afternoon. That hight they came out, and, after hiding along the shore of the St. Lawrence for a day, they secured a boat and escaped across the river to Clayton.

Erwin John was travelling from Chicago to New York on January 4, 1915, when he was taken from a Michigan Central train at Ningara Falls, Ont.
