

EXCHANGE OF PRISONERS.

Only Few at Fort Will be Allowed to Return to Germany.

The agreement of the British and German Government to exchange all interned prisoners over the age of forty-five, as announced in a London cable, will not mean the release of very many Germans from Fort Henry. It is thought that there are only about twelve German prisoners who are over forty-five years of age. Of course, said an official, many more will claim that they are past that age, but as there is at the fort a record of the age of each prisoner as given by himself, it will be hard to convince the authorities that they have suddenly grown several years older.

It is unlikely that this agreement includes the soldiers who have been taken prisoners at the front.

So far as the Whig knows, there are no interned Kingstonians in Germany.
