those of the County Judge who hears appeals. For example, a bertala property-owner, a woman, appeared before Judge Winchester yesterday and asked that her assessment be reduced. "What is your property valued at?" asked the court. "I see that it is assessed at \$2,500." "It is worth \$3.500," replied the appellant. 'Then, how do you think I am going to reduce the assessment?" asked the Judge, in surprise. "But I cannot pay the taxes." declared the woman "Perhaps not, but that is not the city's fault," was the reply.
