Wass Meeting Sends Message of Good-will

ROMANOFFS OPPRESSIVE

Still Larger Gathering of "Revolutionary Groups" Will be Arranged for Shortly, When Great Demonstration May be Decided Upon.

A mass meeting of Russians, Poles and Ukranians in Toronto yesterday assed, with swelling enthusiasm, esolution of sympathy and good-will to the new Russian Provisional Govrnment, and expressed the hope that Russian Republic would be estabished. The meeting was held in Broadway Hall, Spadina avenue, which was packed, even down the stairs, with eager listeners. The gathering was called under the auspices of the "revolutionary groups" of these three subdivisions of the Russian peoples, and it is hoped that a still larger gathering may be arranged soon, possibly at Massey Hall. A Russian demonstration was proposed, but not decided upon.

Romanoff Dynasty Harsh.

Mr. A. Swigach presided, and the speakers included Messrs. G. Mack (Russian), Rotschild (Polish) and E. (Russian), Rotschild (Polish) and E. Stephanitzky, editor of the Ukranian newspaper in Toronto. The dynasty of the Romanoffs was described as being oppressive and harsh for the last four hundred years, and the fact mentioned that there were more pri-sons in Russia than there are schools throughout Canada. Rodzianko, President of the Duma, Petrograd, Russia (in Russian), reads: "We, Russian emigrants of Slav race in mass meeting of about one thou-sand men, send our good wishes and sympathy in the efforts of the Provi-sional Revolutionary. Government which took the initiative in leading the people along the road to liberty. Long live the Russian Republic." A collection brought in \$122, and the most marked enthusiasm was shown throughout.
