WILSON WARNS ALIEN ENEMIES

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
Washington, April 16.—All persons in the United States, citizens and aliens, are warned in a proclamation issued to-day by President Wilson that treasonable acts or attempts to shield those committing such acts will be vigorously prosecuted by the Government.

Far-reaching importance attaches to the direction of the warning to allens and the declaration "that resident aliens as well as citizens owe allegiance to the United States," and therefore are equally subject to the laws against treason and like crimes. Not only are conspirators themselves subject to heavy penalties, but anyone, even a German resident, who has knowledge of treasonable acts and falls to make known the facts to the authorities may be sent to prison for seven years and fined \$1,000 for misprison of treason.
