## NO ALIEN ENEMIES In munitions plant

McGregor & McIntyre Factory Has Two Divisions and Facts Were Confused

An injustice was done to the firm of McGregor & McIntyre in the report in The Globe of April 5 of an inquest on the death of Tony Karbchuck. who died from injuries received while riding on a travelling derrick at the firm's plant, Shaw street, Through an inaccuracy of statement it was made to appear that four-fifths of the employees in their plant were "foreigners of alicn enemy countries."

Messrs. McGregor & McIntyre inform us that the structural plant and the munitions plant are entirely separate concerns under separate management, and that while some of the structural steel workers are alien enemies, there are not and have not been any alien enemics employed in the munitions plant.

The Globe regrets that its report did not make it clear that the foreigners employed by McGregor & Mc-Intyro were not necessarily of alien enemy countries, as Mr. McGregor's evidence, while showing that 80 per cent. of their employees at a given time were foreigners, it was an error to assume that they were of alien enemy countries.
