attendance at the House of Commons to-night, received a long-distance telephone message from Montreal this evening, stating that at No.

Museum Buildings in which Parliament is now meeting. The warning
was sent on to Mayor Martin "for
what it is worth." The general feeling of members and officials here tonight was to discredit any contemplated outrage, though the Dominion
police and secret service are on the
alert for eventualities.

## PROPOSAL TO CUT COST OF PARLIAMENT

MR, NORTHRUP WILL ASK FOR COMMITTEE TO DEVISE WAYS OF REDUCTION.

Ottawa, April 26.—Mr. W. B.
Northrup of East Hastings, has given
notice of a resolution asking for a
special committee of the Commons,
consisting of nine members, five to
be named by the leader of the Government and four by the leader of
the Opposition, to consider ways and
means of reducing the cost of Parllament. Mr. Northrup believes that
if the two parties can come together
and cut out a lot of the political
sniping, sessions of Parllament can
be materially shortened and the cost
of legislation considerably reduced.

## 800 CHICAGO STUDENTS FOR CANADA'S FARMS

Chicago, April 26.—The Agricultural College of the University of Illinois has given 800 students to Canada to help harvest the "war-winning wheat crop." The first contingent, composed of nearly 500 men, left Chicago for the Saskatoon district in Western Canada to-night.
