CANNOT TELL HOW MANY.

Mr. Pardee's Question About Soldiers Who Never Got to Firing Line.

Ottawa. May 7.---Sir Edward Kemp said in the Commons to-day that the records of the department were not in such a condition that specific information could be given in reply to a series of questions by Mr. F. F. Pardee, asking for the number of soldiers who had been returned to Canada from England without ever having gone to the firing line, or the number of men who had been brought British Columbia to eastern from Canadian points and then been returned as medically unfit without getting overseas at all.

London, May 7.-News was received to day from Geneva confirming the report that Licut. William Leefs Robinson of the Roya Flying Corps has not been killed, as was announced last month, but is a prisoner oo the Germans. Licut.
