I notice that the coal strike in the west is by no means nearer settlement, and what are the people, especially in the west, going to do with a hard winter ahead and a coal shortage. And we notice that 60 per cent, of the strikers are enemy aliens. There is a laborers' strike at the dry dock at Port Arthur, and 362 men are on strike, 176 of them being Americans, and striking for 50 cents a day increase although being offered their demands plus 10 per cent, to finish the job, which was to finish the steamer Roberts to enable her to take a cargo of grain for the old country. This, I imagine, is just as serious as the coal strike. The Free Press states the waiters

in a cafe have gone on strike · because an Englishman was employed there. These said waiters, according to the article, being Austrians, and the head waiter and leader of them at one time being interned, which does not speak very well of his feelings and intentions towards the allied cause, and naturally voices the feelings of all enemy aliens towards the native born Canadian, British, French, Italian, etc., etc. And yet the Free Press which pub-lished the news of the strike, prints
