

TWO DRASTIC BILLS BEFORE U.S. SENATE

Bar Publication of Any War News in Foreign Language

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Washington, Aug. 13.—Publication of war news and comment on international or political questions affecting the war in German or other foreign language newspapers unless accompanied by a parallel column with a true and correct translation in English, would be forbidden by a bill introduced to-day by Senator King.

Deportation or **internment** for citizens naturalized within the last twenty years found guilty of uttering or publishing statements disloyal to the United States or tending to incite sedition or insurrection is proposed in another bill introduced by Senator King. The Attorney-General would be instructed to bring suits against such persons to cancel naturalization papers.

SPAIN AGAIN UPSET BY GENERAL STRIKE

Men Lay Down Tools and Go Home Quietly—Will Last a Day

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Madrid, Aug. 13.—The strike begun on Friday night by the railroad employees became general at an early hour this morning, when masons, painters, carpenters and other workmen quit work. As the men received their orders to lay down their tools they went quietly home, and no incidents so far have been reported.

Some of the strikers declared that the general strike would last only

twenty-four hours, and that the movement was one in sympathy with the railroad men.

Shops are open as usual, and the population is indifferent.

AIRMEN KILL GERMANS.

Amsterdam, Aug. 13.—An Entente airplane on Sunday passed over Frankfort-on-the-Main and dropped several bombs in the crowded streets, according to a despatch received here to-day from the German city. Four persons were killed and several others were wounded. On Saturday Frankfort was raided by a number of Entente airmen, who dropped several bombs. No one was killed. A few inmates of a hospital were injured slightly. One of the aviators dropped five bombs in a wood to the west of Frankfort without causing any damage.
